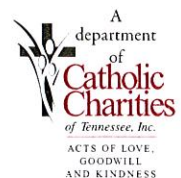

Anticipated Arrivals:

The U.S. Department of State allocates refugees based on where the resettlement agency is located. In FFY (federal fiscal year) 2014, refugees have been allocated to programs in the counties below. Actual arrivals may vary. *This estimate is less than last year's projections.* The local refugee resettlement program meets quarterly with local officials and together believe that the programs in these counties have the capacity to successfully resettle refugees.
